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Gettysburg Revisited

“Cousins” and Friends Enjoy the 78th Annual Meeting and Reunion of the Association of Blauvelt Descendants

Ghostly sights were visited; we toured the battlefields; we remembered our Ancestral Blauvelt Soldiers; we listened and learned many things about the Battle of Gettysburg; we met “Mr. Lincoln;” we ate, sang and yes, we even got a little wet from the torrential rains and winds of Hurricane “Ivan the Terrible.” We all enjoyed being together at this American historic site.

As Jim Curren reminded us, “This is the greatest number of Blauvelts returning to visit Gettysburg at any one time since July of 1863.”

Attendees began to gather on Thursday afternoon for our Thursday evening Candlelight Walking Tour, “Ghosts of Gettysburg.” Two groups left Lincoln Square to visit what might very well be the “most haunted place in America,” Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. We had no guarantees, but we did see where those *ghosts* have been seen.

Through the streets of Gettysburg, we walked and listened to our guides, stopping at houses and buildings where the wounded suffered and died and to burial sites where maybe it’s not so peaceful. The tales were interesting and, well maybe, we were lucky with no actual sightings, *or did some see something? Who knows? They’re not telling!*

Friday’s “Tour Day” began when we filled two luxury coaches that awaited us for a full day of visits to the National Military Park, the Eisenhower Farm, our Remembrance Ceremony, guided Battlefield Tours, and a fun stop at Boyds Country Bears. “Ivan” wouldn’t dampen the spirits of this group who were prepared with umbrellas and rain gear.

The morning started with a visit to the Gettysburg National Military Park including the National Cemetery, the Visitor Center and Museum and the thirty minute “must see” Civil War battle orientation called the Electric Map. The 750 square foot map with 600 colored lights and taped narration presents the area, as it looked in 1863 and shows the movements of both the Union and Confederate forces during the three day battle.

Our morning tour also included visiting the Home and Farm of General Dwight David Eisenhower, our 34th President. The property is adjacent to the Battlefield.

The rains held off a bit until we reached the close of our morning’s activities at the Eternal Light Peace Memorial for our Remembrance and Wreath Laying Ceremony of those Blauvelt Descendants who fought in the Civil War. One hundred and fourteen names were read by seven descendants from each one of


